Project Overview Invitation to Host the Exhibit

global team of journalists and researchers at the University of Southern California produced more than 100 stories about people dedicated to working for positive social changes as part of the Spiritual Exemplars Project. Often underreported and unseen, spiritual impulses can move individuals and communities toward justice, equality and compassion.

"Stories for Social Change: Spirituality in Action" is a multimedia exhibit that presents the narratives of these changemakers. It was originally presented at the USC Annenberg for Communication and Journalism, educating and inspiring 2,500 people in Fall 2023.

Who is a spiritual exemplar?

This exhibit is part of "Spiritual Exemplars: A Global Project on Engaged Spirituality." From 2018 to 2023, the USC Center for Religion and Civic Culture (CRCC) commissioned stories about 104 spiritual exemplars.

CRCC defined a spiritual exemplar as:

- A living individual located anywhere in the world
- Inspired and sustained by spiritual values, beliefs or practices
- Significant impact that advances human flourishing
- Admired and emulated by others within and beyond their community
- Respects human rights, such as those defined by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights

The exhibit is available for presentation in educational, civic, religious and communal spaces. The content can be adapted to different spaces and audiences.



Marie Stella Kouak

Sister Marie Stella Kouak, a nurse, established Living in Hope in 1999 to assist those who suffered from HIV/AIDS. As antiretroviral therapy was not available in Togo until 2006, she spent her first years organizing funerals and trying to provide a dignified death to those treated as outcasts.

Now one of the largest nonprofit organizations in Northern Togo, Living in Hope distinguishes itself by adopting a holistic approach to fighting HIV/AIDS.

Living in Hope runs two orphanages and supports 1,850 children living in foster families. It also operates a shop, a sewing workshop and a farm that generates income for the charity. In 2017, a new health center was inaugurated, and in 2020, a primary school was established.

Kouak wakes up at 4:15 am for an hour of peaceful prayer and prays for an hour at noon in the midst of a packed schedule. "As a woman of faith, I cannot give in to discouragement," she says.

Tuenjai Deetes

Thailand has one of the largest numbers of stateless people in the world.

Thai human rights and environmental activist Tuenjai Deetes established Hill Area Development Foundation, which helps the stateless population gain Thai citizenship, runs education programs and supports activities of environmental protection in Northern Thailand.

"I want every human being to have dignity, to have equal rights by the law and to participate in social development. And I also wish for all human beings to live with nature peacefully and mutually," says Deetes.

As a former member of the National Legislative Assembly and a National Human Rights Commissioner, Deetes has initiated various amendments of laws and regulations for naturalization. Partially thanks to her work, more than 90,000 people received their Thai citizenship in recent years.

A dedicated Buddhist, Tuenjai Deetes treats people with loving-kindness, and makes an effort every day to help at least one person.



The USC Center for Religion and Civic Culture (CRCC) has studied the local faith community's efforts to create change since the aftermath of Los Angeles' 1992 Civil Unrest. In the 1990s, photographer Jerry Berndt (deceased 2013) documented the worship and civic activities of congregations for "The Soul of Los Angeles" exhibit, including two spiritual exemplars: **Rev. Cecil L. Murray** and **Father Greg Boyle, SJ.**

Berndt later traveled with CRCC's cofounder Donald E. Miller to Rwanda, where he recorded the impact of the 1994 genocide of 800,000 Tutsi people, and exemplar Jean Gakwandi's efforts to comfort survivors.

Jerry Berndt's photographs appeared in major magazines and are included in several permanent collections, including the Museum of Modern Art, New York City.
